I've asked to make enquiries with CWC but from looking further into this there are some interesting shots on Google streetview over the years. At no time are the stands greater than approx. 2 to 3 feet and the area doesn't appear to be expanding much. My research also informs that it grows at **up to 2cm per day** which means it will take up to 2 months to get to 1.2 metres. If it was at head height as reported on the 15th June, say that is 6 feet or 180cm, then it would take 90 days to grow even when at its greatest rate. It dies back in the winter, doesn't start growing until spring and is susceptible to frost, remember we extended gritting until late April, so this reported knotweed stand must have grown to 180 cm in 6 weeks or 42 days therefore at a rate of over 4cm per day right from day one, unlikely in my opinion.

Can you please get me the GRASP cycle dates where the cutting of this area was completed, what works were going on, what was completed during the cycle. There is no blane associated to this enquiry but it is unlikely to go away, we just need to be straight with the information, to give inaccurate detail will only raise further doubt and therefore questions,

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Our first visit there was on 15 June

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A week or so later, my contact noticed that the site had been cleared and sprayed with some kind of herbicide. There were no canes or other Japanese knotweed material at the location. It was completely bare.

The Japanese knotweed has since grown back to around 2ft high and is 3ft high in places. This is both at the large stand close to the underpass and further up – which is now accessible due to the original stand being removed – where the sliproad joins the A4232.

During our visit yesterday, we found the dried, brown remains of a single, thin, Japanese knotweed cane. There were no others there. I took photographs of the re-growth which will show that there are no canes on the ground.

So I cannot see how this observation can be reconciled with the assertion that "deposits" were left to "mulch down to avoid cuttings being transported off site". As I said, the site was cleared back in June.

Also, I believe there is a further discrepancy in the council's statement; that the site was "treated over the winter". Japanese knotweed dies back over the winter. All that is left above ground is the dead woody canes from the previous year's growth. Cutting these down would hardly be called "treatment" as they would not deter the expect growth (as opposed to re-growth) in the spring.

So I query what treatment has been carried out at the site both in the winter and recently and why?

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

Thanks for your email of 02.02.16 saying Cardiff council has nothing to add to the statement sent a few days earlier regarding my inquiry about the clearance of a stand of Japanese knotweed on the Leckwith slip road of the A4232 some time after 15 June this year.

As you know, and bearing in mind that Japanese knotweed is a controlled waste under two pieces of legislation (the **Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981** and the **Environmental Protection Act 1990**) I have asked questions about the clearance of the stand in question.

I am not persuaded my questions have been fully answered by the statement(s) (in fact just one statement that is re-stated in response to further questioning).

Specifically, the statement(s) says "deposits" were left to "mulch down to avoid cuttings being transported off site". As I have said, I and a witness saw the site cleared of all vegetation. There were no cuttings to be seen.

Further, during a visit to the site on 1 August, I did then find one bare, brown knotweed cane which would correspond with it having been cut down and left some weeks earlier. It was the only dead cane amid the fresh growth of knotweed. As I have said, I have photographs of the re-growth which will show that there are no canes on the ground that would correspond with a whole stand being felled.

So, if the fresh, green Japanese knotweed canes that were cut down were not taken away, then there is a mystery as why only one cane can be found there now. And it is a mystery that is not answered in the statement(s) you and provided.

Any Japanese knotweed removed from a location must be accounted for. And any that is left on a site must not be left in such a way that it could in following days or weeks be inadvertently moved to another location (by, for example, being sucked into the slipstream of passing vehicles).

Given the facts outlined above, this email is to ask for a further statement on the matter and one which gives the council's explanation of why no knotweed canes are to be found at a site where a stand of Japanese knotweed has been recently cut down.

As discussed, I re-visited the Leckwith site on the A4232 yesterday evening (1 August) with a professional in the weed-control industry and found the facts on the ground hard to reconcile with the statement below.

Our first visit there was on 15 June

The knotweed stand at this time was at head height in places and was too thick to walk through without forcing someone on to the sliproad. The canes were, naturally, quite substantial.

A week or so later, my contact noticed that the site had been cleared and sprayed with some kind of herbicide. There were no canes or other Japanese knotweed material at the location. It was completely bare.

The Japanese knotweed has since grown back to around 2ft high and is 3ft high in places. This is both at the large stand close to the underpass and further up – which is now accessible due to the original stand being removed – where the sliproad joins the A4232.


During our visit yesterday, we found the dried, brown remains of a single, thin, Japanese knotweed cane. There were no others there. I took photographs of the re-growth which will show that there are no canes on the ground.

So I cannot see how this observation can be reconciled with the assertion that "deposits" were left to "mulch down to avoid cuttings being transported off site". As I said, the site was cleared back in June.

Also, I believe there is a further discrepancy in the council's statement; that the site was "treated over the winter". Japanese knotweed dies back over the winter. All that is left above ground is the dead woody canes from the previous year's growth. Cutting these down would hardly be called "treatment" as they would not deter the expect growth (as opposed to re-growth) in the spring.

So I query what treatment has been carried out at the site both in the winter and recently and why?


Here's the email query I sent in previously about Japanese knotweed claims. If you could get an answer in a couple of days, that would be great.



I have checked with Street Ops and confirm no works have been carried out recently. Street Ops visited Site last week with Complete Weed Control, and the JK has been previously cut back and left on site as recommended for an alternative method of treatment compared to waiting until September which is the only time in the year we can spray effectively.

Just to let you know CWC are currently preparing a report of the extent of JK on the principal road network for me, which I plan to treat in September as recommended. There appears to be more JK on the principal network than we may realise.

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Our first visit there was on 15 June

The knotweed stand at this time was at head height in places and was too thick to walk through without forcing someone on to the sliproad. The canes were, naturally, quite substantial.

A week or so later, my contact noticed that the site had been cleared and sprayed with some kind of herbicide. There were no canes or other Japanese knotweed material at the location. It was completely bare.

The Japanese knotweed has since grown back to around 2ft high and is 3ft high in places. This is both at the large stand close to the underpass and further up – which is now accessible due to the original stand being removed – where the sliproad joins the A4232.

During our visit yesterday, we found the dried, brown remains of a single, thin, Japanese knotweed cane. There were no others there. I took photographs of the re-growth which will show that there are no canes on the ground.

So I cannot see how this observation can be reconciled with the assertion that "deposits" were left to "mulch down to avoid cuttings being transported off site". As I said, the site was cleared back in June.

Also, I believe there is a further discrepancy in the council's statement; that the site was "treated over the winter". Japanese knotweed dies back over the winter. All that is left above ground is the dead woody canes from the previous year's growth. Cutting these down would hardly be called "treatment" as they would not deter the expect growth (as opposed to re-growth) in the spring.

So I query what treatment has been carried out at the site both in the winter and recently and why?

Statement below -

A council spokesman said: "This area of Japanese Knotweed on the A4232 had previously been identified during routine grass cutting. Following its identification the area was treated over the winter. Regrowth occurred and this was then cut back, taking the recommended precaution of not using flails and leaving deposits to mulch down to avoid cuttings being transported off-site. This course of action is in line with published Welsh Government codes of practice."
